Becoming a Better Husband

Over the past year and a half, I have spent a lot of time thinking about who I am as a husband. Unfortunately, this journey didn't start because I took a class on the roles of men and women like the one our church began teaching in early January. No, the journey started because my actions nearly resulted in a divorce.

The near-destruction of my marriage didn't happen overnight; it was the result of years of neglect that drove my wife and me into opposing corners. All the upset and heartache was largely brought on because I had a worldly view of marriage. Also, because my parents had a mostly good marriage, I sought their advice instead of God's.

After a particularly dark time in our marriage, it was by the grace of God that I began my Christian walk. During this time, my wife and I started going to a faith-based program called Retrouvaille and, later, to counseling. Though the experience in the three-day Retrouvaille weekend did wonders for our marriage, ultimately it was my study and reading of God's word that began changing my heart.

One of the key verses that influenced how I treat my wife today is Ephesians 5:25: "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for her." This was profound to me. I had just read the Gospels for the first time, so the weight of that sacrifice was still on my heart, and here God was calling me to do the same for my wife? To love her in the way that Christ loves me, to sacrifice for her as Christ sacrificed for me – this is a high calling. I certainly had never done that before.

When you really think about it, Ephesians 5:25 covers a lot of ground. To love your wife as Christ loved, and to sacrifice for your wife as Christ sacrificed, doesn't just mean bringing her flowers once in a while and giving up an NFL game here and there to watch a show with her instead. It means that we should be putting our wives ahead of ourselves in all situations. It means that our wives' needs should come before our own, always.

I have come to realize that the beauty of a godly marriage where both husband and wife both play their part, is that our tendencies toward control and selfishness are replaced with sacrifice for each other, which fulfills the needs of both husband and wife. I have also come to the conclusion that as the Godappointed leader in my marriage, it is my job to sacrifice FIRST—not to wait for my wife to play her part, but to LEAD by playing mine. God's word is good, and obeying it can change our lives. Loving as Christ loved and sacrificing as Christ sacrificed, not in response to my wife's actions but in response to God, has changed our marriage.

Brothers, if this is an area where you struggle, then I urge you to think about what Christ did for you, and to reciprocate by leading your wife with love and self-sacrifice. It will take time to overcome the consequences of the past, but through your persistent love and sacrifice, your marriage will eventually change for the better.
